We had 82 total submissions, 69 accepted. 26 advancing to the 2<sup>nd</sup> round.

We had a total of 278 people who formed part of the submission teams, from 6 continents, including 26 countries and 16 states.

That's probably the best numbers. I could give you the number of people signed up on the pqc-forum (about 1300) or the number of official comments, but those aren't as interesting.

As for what to say, maybe just that we invite the cryptographic community to evaluate the 26 second round candidates, as we need all the help we can get. They are a diverse group of algorithms, which requires experts from many different fields.
